#### TIPS TO HELP STAY SAFE WHILE WALKING IN THE DARK

When walking in the dark, it is important to wear clothing that makes you visible to drivers and other pedestrians. Here are some tips to help you stay safe:

- <u>Wear light-colored clothing.</u> Dark colors do not show up well in the dark, so it's best to wear lightcolored clothing that makes you more visible. You can also consider wearing clothing with reflective strips or patches, which can help drivers see you from a distance.
- <u>Use lights or strobes.</u> Small flashing strobe lights can be clipped to your clothing to provide visibility without adding any weight. You can also use flashlights or flashlight apps on your phone to illuminate your path and avoid tripping hazards. If you walk fast with your arms bent, you may prefer a headlamp to a flashlight for steady illumination of your path.
- <u>Stay aware of your surroundings</u>. Always be aware of your surroundings and avoid walking in areas that are poorly lit or have uneven surfaces. If possible, walk with a friend or a group for added safety.

Planning to travel during the holiday season? The following tips can help you stay healthy and make your celebrations more enjoyable.


• Don't overextend

#### FINANCIAL REPORT

It has been an exciting time to serve as CFO and I have appreciated the support received from the members as our Board navigated through some challenging financial decisions.



This board has been dedicated to maintaining the structural integrity of our buildings, all of the amenities, and all of the landscaping and trees on our 160 acres. These efforts serve to enhance our property values and maintain the standard of living we enjoy, which in turn benefits each member of our Association.

2023 has been unique in my experience as a Landmark owner. Our winter weather was rough by Southern California standards – the rains revealing the age of our underground drainage systems which required significant repair. The rain also revealed leaks which necessitated roof and building repairs extending through to, and including, the drywall.

Our irrigation infrastructure is at least 40 years old and valve replacements continue to occur on a regular, almost weekly, basis. Inflation hit us across the board and increased expenses that impacted all aspects of our HOA operations.

As CFO, the best financial news for 2023 was the increase in interest rates available for our CDs!!

During this past year we were surprised by Insurance increases, utilities increases, building materials and labor costs increases, all of which played a role in our determining the need to increase dues for 2024.

Our HOA has made significant and substantial progress on our Building Renovation and Landscape Renovation plans. Regarding our buildings, we are systematically working to reinforce, refurbish, paint and otherwise protect the buildings. Regarding our landscape we are working to reduce water consumption, reduce landscape maintenance and remain in compliance with California legislation regarding landscape irrigation.

These renovation expenditures preserve the integrity of the owner's investment and should result in a cost savings over time. As a bonus to living on campus, our renovations are truly beautiful once completed. These renovation costs are paid for by our Reserve Funding. We have not increased the percentage of monthly dues dedicated to reserves, thus as a result of increasing costs, the percentage of reserves funded for 2024 will dip slightly – from 39% in 2023, to 35.3% for 2024.

However, once the renovation plans are complete the reserve amount expensed yearly for renovation will decrease significantly which should allow for reserve funding to increase toward our

desired goal of 70%.



As always, and as stated regularly, our objective is to maintain the structural integrity of our buildings; to maintain the park-like environment of our 160 acres, and to employ the finest vendors to meet our need for a safe, well managed, and wellmaintained community.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve on this Board and as the CFO.

#### **EMERGENCY READINESS**

What about a gas leak? First of all, recognize a natural gas leak by following these 3 steps:

- 1. Do you smell that distinctive, odd odor?
- 2. Look at the connections to your gas appliances for dirt/water blowing in the air, dead vegetation, or even a fire or explosion near a pipeline.
- 3. And then listen for unusual sounds like hissing or whistling.

If you determine that there is a gas leak, immediately evacuate the area and call SoCalGas at (1-800-427-2200). Then call 911. Don't smoke or light a match or candle. Don't touch electrical appliances, lights or motorized equipment or vehicles — they could cause a spark. Lastly, don't try to fix the leak yourself. You could create static electricity that would ignite the gas. Not good.

Call Paul Kanter (310-991-8519) for more information. Our next EPG meeting will be January 15, 2024, at 1 p.m. in MPR1. No meeting in December. Remember, you are responsible for yourself in an emergency.

#### **CONSERVATION CORNER**

I love to walk our neighborhood and breathe the delicious ocean-fresh air; or open up the windows to let the breezes blow. Until...the perfumed odor of dryer sheets wafts in.

I have used them myself, so I'm not wagging a finger! But I have become aware that – though not technically toxic – the chemicals can pose a real irritant to the airways, and sometimes even the skin. In addition, it is a disposable product that must be replenished.

You can purchase a set of wool dryer balls at Trader Joe's for \$5.99, at Von's and other stores, plus online. Check the label to make sure they are odorless, dye-and chemical-free, as some do have additives.

The most important reason to use dryer balls is to preserve fresh, clean air with no irritating chemicals for you and your neighbors. Secondly, there is a one-time cost rather than paying over and over for a disposable product. And finally, saving our planet from additional items and chemicals going in the landfill.

#### **BIKE SAFETY RULES**

Huntington Landmark Rules and Regulations

#### 5.0 BICYCLES

5.1 Bicyclists are required to follow CA Vehicle Code regulations regarding "rules of the road," including traffic signals and signs, driving with the flow of traffic, obeying the speed limits and remaining in traffic lanes.

5.2 Riding on sidewalks is prohibited; residents must walk bicycles when on the sidewalk.

5.3 Walk bicycles through the pedestrian gate when entering or exiting the community.

5.4 Bicycles are required to be placed in the garages or inside patio areas when not in use.

5.5 Storing bicycles in breezeways is prohibited. Ref CC&Rs 4.20







Grandma's tree was trimmed with popcorn and cranberry garlands, bubbling lights, real glass ornaments and the shimmering silver tinsel to top it off. Those lights full of sparkling bubbles looked like the candles that were used before electricity to light holiday trees, and to this child in a time before television they added a certain touch of magic to behold. My thrifty grandmother draped the base of the tree with a white bed sheet to resemble snow.

"Looking back, I realize Grandma didn't have the money to spend on gifts and festivities as the grandmothers of today do. Most of her shopping was done at the Woolworth's five and dime store on the main street of our small Kansas town. The true meaning of Christmas, though, was commemorated by a simple manager scene under Grandma's tree. As a child I lay on the floor to view the small Christ child in the manger, pondering what this dime-store figurine was all about."

Living Staff member Renee Barger, who has passed, wrote, "Chanukah, "Hannukah, Hannuk ... there are many ways to celebrate this festive Jewish holiday as there are many ways to spell it. The importance of the event is that it was a fight for religious freedom for the Maccabees, a small band of Jewish people, against the mighty Syrian army in 165BCE. When the battle was over and they had taken back their temple, there was only enough oil left to keep the lantern left for one day. Miraculously, the oil lasted for eight and Hannuhak has become known as the festival of lights celebrated for eight days. At about sunset a candle is lit adding one more each night. The candles are burned in Menorah or Hannuhiak along with the helper candle with which they are lit. Prayers are recited and songs are sung. Games are played including the popular dreidel, a spinning top, and potato latkes or pancakes are devoured with apple sauce or sour cream."


